Sometimes you wonder who copied whom; their reflections are so similar that such resemblance seems to result from a kind of spiritual kinship. It began in June with a trip to Michigan to meet my "new older brother" Michael. After my dad died, I found a letter in his files entitled "To be read upon my demise." Apparently when Dad was 18 and in the Navy, he fathered a child. This was long before he met my Mom and my two brothers and I were not even thought of. Because he was being shipped off to Okinawa (World War II), he stated that due to all of the uncertainties that go with being in war, he didn't want to commit to marriage but would provide financially for the birth of his child, who he later learned was a son. For reasons only he knew, he never contacted this woman or his son, nor did he tell any of us about him.

With the help of some friends, my brother David and I were able to find and contact him within two weeks of making this discovery. This was pretty much a miracle, since we didn't know his first name and the census from when he was born had not yet been released.

Since finding and connecting with him, we have phoned each other and written one another on a regular basis, often exchanging pictures and answering questions about our Dad, as well as Michael's family. After doing so for over a year, during which the pandemic prohibited travel, my brother David and I went to meet Mike this summer. Everything went really well and we had a wonderful visit! We spent a week sharing the better part of most everyday with Mike, exploring his area and meeting most of the rest of his birth family. It was a joy to meet his Mom - my Dad's girlfriend of so many years ago. She is 97, living on her own and still very with it. After talking with her, I got the impression that Dad may have been her first true love. She was only 18 years old at the time when they dated and she has always wondered what had happened to Dad. I believe it was a very healing trip for both her and Michael, which made it a gift for us all.

We continue to stay in contact and look forward to him coming to Florida to visit us in April 2022. In the meantime, it has been a delight to meet and even spend time with one of Mike's four children, my newly discovered niece, whose own Mom remarkably lives in nearby St. Petersburg!

At the end of June, Barbara Sousa, Laura Grasso, Paula Lyn, Cheryl Maggio, and I traveled to the Motherhouse in Allegany. This came about as a last request from Laura. She had made the difficult decision in late Spring to stop treatment for her cancer since it was no longer working and she just wanted us to "go home one last time," to the place where our lifetime friendship first blossomed.

Knowing that her remaining time on Earth was limited to only a few months, we quickly began planning this trip even though we were aware that the Motherhouse was still understandably in COVID lockdown. We honestly weren't sure if we would be sitting out on the front steps simply waving to the Sisters or if Laura would even physically be up to the journey, but we stepped out in faith and made plans anyway for flights and even found a nearby house where we could all stay in our own vaccinated bubble.

Miraculously, the Motherhouse not only re-opened just prior to our arrival, but thankfully we arrived just in time for the first Liturgy with music since COVID protocols were put into place. Together, we celebrated the life of Sister Charlotte O'Brien with loud and exuberant voices! The Sisters could not have been more loving or more welcoming to us. We even had a big ice cream social where all of the Sisters who were able came to the assembly room to visit with us. We also had a few visits and spent many hours laughing with our Ritiro Sisters, as well as sharing prayer with them. We visited daily with our Sisters, enjoyed a tour of the newly designed place, and always made a point to stop into the Ritiro.

Of course the journey would have not been complete without us including a couple of trips up to the cemetery, where we stopped to say hello, utter a prayer of thanks, and share more memories of our treasured mentors and dear friends who, although departed, are always kept close to our hearts. We talked and laughed well into the wee hours of the morning, shared photographs, and honored and remembered so many of those whom we have been blessed to know and share life with over the years!

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God bless Laura for giving us the impetus to do what we may not have otherwise done had it not been for "her dream and last wishes." It serves as a lesson for us all, to move beyond years of talk to the action of celebrating life lived and loved with those who remain such an intricate part of who we each have become.

This wonderful "homecoming" trip to the Motherhouse perfectly prepared my heart for my journey to the border as a volunteer at the McAllen, TX Respite Center. When I traveled to the border, I carried with me all of the love, energy, affirmation and indeed the very spirit of the Allegany Franciscan Sisters and Associates. That was perhaps the best warm up that anyone could ever hope for as preparation. I loved, respected and prayed for all that I encountered while at The Respite Center. Truly it was all about LOVE. I don't know how to speak Spanish, therefore my only language quite literally had to be love each time I volunteered or was interacting with the immigrants on a daily basis.

As volunteers, our primary task was to serve in support roles, while it was the role of the hired staff to take care of the travel arrangements and many of the details that require lengthy conversations with the immigrants. One morning, with the assistance of two immigrants from Guatemala, we made over 300 sandwiches. The lunches we were preparing were to be sent with each person as they left by bus or plane to meet up with their families and sponsors. To complete this task, I had to mime the procedure we were to use, before proceeding to work side-by-side, smiling and laughing together, without understanding a single word that each other said.

What was truly remarkable to me through my experience, was that no matter the number of people who came through the Respite Center each day, whether it was several hundred or even 3,000 which did occur while there, each and every one of these immigrants were always patient, gracious and happy for any and all assistance given to them.

When, God willing, the dangers of COVID finally decrease, I would highly encourage any of you who feel called, to consider going yourself to volunteer at the border. If you are unable to do so or do not feel called in this way, I would encourage you to educate yourself regarding the circumstances faced by immigrants and to consider standing up for and giving voice to the needs of those who are so desperately seeking a better way of life for themselves, their children and their families. Like many of our own ancestors, is this not ultimately a journey of hope and of love?

So as you reflect with me on all three of these life-changing experiences, I hope you too can see why I consider my summer to indeed be a "summer of love" in so many ways. Since we are all called to LOVE, knowing that is who God is, I pray that in some way your summer was love-filled as well.
