DISCERNMENT REFLECTION

A. I, Lucy Cardet, am grateful for the opportunity to have participated in this process with other sisters who have been invited to discern the call to serve in congregational leadership.

Our prayer, sharing, and small group work at our Tampa discernment retreat affirmed for me the value of hearing *different* insights and working *together*. Knowing that others were praying for us was in itself a support.

- B. Having prayerfully reflected on my personal abilities, experience and challenges, I've had a "fit of common sense". My current "leaning" is to withdraw from further consideration for congregational leadership. My primary reason is that, at this time in my life, I no longer have the necessary energy, memory retention, and ability for multi-tasking that is required. I can (and will) serve the congregation but not in this capacity.
- C. God can do the impossible. However, I don't think that this role is what God is asking of me now. I will continue to discern what that might be. God is not done with me yet.
- D. Thank you to all those who have invited, affirmed and supported me. I took your comments seriously. It is time to let others lead the congregation. I will continue to pray for them and you.

Good morning everyone!

First of all I want to thank you for your invitations to participate in this discernment process and for your prayers, words of support and affirmation. Actually, I was not expecting to receive any invitations and I had prayed that I wouldn't!!! That being said, here I am. I came to the discernment with a lot of anxiety but with an open heart and mind with great dependence on the spirit as is evidenced in my symbol on the table. In truth, it was your recognition and affirmation of gifts you saw in me were the driving forces that brought me to this place. I know I have gifts, however, most often I either don't recognize them or I take them for granted. So, I am grateful to you for your sharing with me.

Although this discernment process was (is) a bit of a stretch for me, I must admit as we worked together as a group during those few days two weeks ago I was beginning to recognize some inner freedom surfacing that enabled me stay open to the process. For me there was and has been chaos and confusion during this process and truth be told, I don't function well amidst chaos. There have been moments of second guessing myself and wondering why I even said "yes" to entering into this discernment. With that said though two weeks ago I did decide to continue in the process of discerning for a leadership role but not for elected leadership.

Regarding my role in leadership and what I would bring to the table is basically my continued involvement in one way or another in the affairs

of the Congregation. What would I bring to the table today? Today with the uncertainty of what will be? Today, with possible changes in governance structure? I can tell you what I wouldn't be bringing, and that is, I'm not a visionary thinker and find it difficult to think out of the box but I would continue to bring my gifts of organizational skills and inclusivity – whereas, all would **not only** be welcomed at the table but also their voices would be heard as well. I pay attention to detail, am objective, practical and realistic and find it relatively easy to "fill in the missing links" in a plan. And most always I have plan B in my back pocket.

Thinking of what I need from you, my sisters. In addition to your being honest with me, I need you to have faith in me that given this experience of discerning for a leadership role we can **together** be open to the spirit to guide and direct us to what is best for our Congregation and for me at this time in our history.

- Sisters, many of you affirmed and invited me to participate in the process. Thank you for making me one of your three choices.
- For me, it is further affirmed that each of us has a role to play in leadership, regardless of our capabilities, so when we voice our perspectives, we influence others, and we are influenced by others.
- I experienced sisters' expressions of sincere love for our Congregation that helped to strengthen my own love and commitment.

Share your current "leaning" toward remaining or withdrawing from the process and your primary reason(s) why.

My current "Leaning" is to remain open and stay in the discernment process for elected leadership because I am available and willing to explore and express what I can possibly bring to the table while living into the call. I am moved and encouraged by the sisters who invited me to the process because they expressed that they believe I have gifts that could serve the congregation in this new paradigm. Also, I am experiencing REVITALIZING energy around the leadership approaches that we are framing, they offer opportunities for inclusion, experimentation, and ownership by the sisters.

In what kind of role, and what kind of competences, do you see yourself bringing to the table as a leader?

Serving as Councilor now, I believe my gifts could have been better matched to tasks and utilized more effectively. Going forward, while I am open to leadership generally, I think I could still serve as Councilor in mutual relationships with sisters in leadership, empowering each other by exploring, recognizing, appreciating and drawing upon others' gifts in service. Among the competencies I would bring are:

- Interpersonal skills- ability to work with different personalities
- Presence and listening abilities
- Attention to details, my goal-oriented approach to what needs to be done
- Perseverance and commitment in good and not so good situations

- Organizational skills, using trends of the time to plan and influence change and to guide the process.
- Background experiences in leadership positions:
 as Councilor in this current leadership and
 as President/principal at the college in Jamaica

What do you need from your sisters at this Regional Gathering that will aid you in furthering your discernment (e.g. to become more free, informed and clear, more connected with your sisters)?

In closing, I am highlighting two points which I think are similar to all of us in this process.

- That we are in this process together as one congregation having conversations that matter.
- That we are supportive of each other despite our differences to facilitate exploring possibilities for our life in the future.

Reflection Response - Discernment Retreat

Thank you for this opportunity.

For the discernment weekend, I brought a seashell that holds a lot meaning. I found it on the beach at Pt. Lookout in the 70's. While at Holy Cross, Bronx the community would go to the Point for weekends of prayer. This small conch shell is rather ordinary, but tucked into the spiral is a tiny seashell, reminding me of God's love and presence holding me. All these years the small shell has remained in place reminding me that I dwell within the heart and love of God.

Over the years, in parish ministry and leadership, I've learned that leadership is not about power, control or authority over others. Rather it's about collaboration, listening, and cooperating through dialogue and working together.

The discernment weekend was a good experience for me. I was comfortable and experienced myself as being open to the process and to everyone gathered. I enjoyed working in our small group designing a new way of governance. It reaffirmed for me how much I enjoy engaging with others in open, creative and often playful encounters exploring new ideas.

I'm willing to remain engaged in discernment, to be influenced and open to the Spirit. I'm willing to be of service to the congregation. Over the years, and especially in these past 3 years, I have learned a lot about myself.

- To be more transparent with others in what might be affecting me personally,
- To take time and sit with another, to be attentive and explore what they might be experiencing,
- To be more inquisitive to **seek and ask for greater clarity** rather than rush to judgement or decision.

I believe I bring:

- A balance of administrative and personal/pastoral skills
- Creativity and imagination to projects and tasks with others in teamwork
- Self-discipline and follow through on what needs to be done, while also learning to balance work and time-off to relax and rest.
- Personal integrity and professionalism in representing and speaking for our Congregation with other organizations and within the wider church
- Technological and communication skills (speaking and writing)
- Good health, energy and interest to continue to serve.

What I need and appreciate is hearing your thoughts, feedback and insights, not only on community matters, but especially on how I might be coming across to you. I'm willing to look at myself and continue to grow and to serve.

The invitations to participate in discernment for Leadership provided me with a great deal to consider and in many cases, supported my personal reflections. The input confirmed my growing desire to be of service in a new way. I was affirmed by those that zeroed in on their perception of my personal growth. I attribute this to repetitive CARE training, which provided opportunities to more deeply appreciate my sisters and discover anew my inner self.

The loving and direct challenges of some Invitations confirmed my own thoughts about the wear of nearly four years of travel and the intensity of the work that has been part of this leadership. Through all, I came to recognize that **there** are some "what ifs" in my life that might slow me down or limit my ability to be an effective member of any kind of Leadership.

Such feedback, reflection and prayer caused me to question, would my recommitment truly be a

call to my soul? And during the discernment retreat I was presented with 21 sisters who joined in this discernment for leadership and they filled my heart and soul with hope and freedom.

My leaning right now is to stay in the process to focus on my belief that, with open minds and hearts I and we will hear the in insights of every member and absorb the drops of wisdom, flights of imagination and flashes of insight from the women through whom God speaks to inspire us.

I firmly accept that we are being invited to evolve, take what is best in us, to experiment, accept trial, error and adapt, to join with others to become the difference needed today and beyond. At this point I am leaning toward and anticipating a developing definition of leadership in which I may in some form, FULLY participate.

I also am concerned about our seeming inability to face our future concretely, knowing that by Chapter 2029 we may have a much smaller leadership pool. Thank you for listening. Bernadette Schuler Assembly Response

I began my discernment at a retreat the weekend before Christmas. At that time I was feeling anxious and I heard God calling me to "stay in the light of Jesus' presence" and not to be afraid of what may lie ahead.

I received invitations from 5 sisters whom I believe know me on a deeper level. In those, I heard an affirmation of my love for the Congregation, my listening skills, and the ability to let go of my own idea if a better one was offered. My organizational skills were noted, which could carry over from ministry as a DRE and with volunteers in parishes. I was reminded that I have served the Congregation in a variety of large and small ways and always discerned where God and the community were calling me in the process. I acknowledge these gifts as God-given and community-developed over the years—not my own doing except in responding to the grace given to me.

I was challenged to believe in myself and to have courage (stone) as I listen and discern further. I was challenged to practice self-care and asked if I was willing to leave my ministry with the poor to give more time in service to the community.

The process with our other sister discerners was heartening to me as each shared her doubts and fears as well as hopes for our future. I felt energized by the spirit and openness among us.

At this time I am willing to remain in the process at least through the 2nd Discernment Retreat in May. I need more clarity (not total clarity) about what I am saying yes to. I need a sense of what a new leadership design may call forth from me/us. At the same time, I realize this is a continuing organic process that requires trust and faith.

I believe I can bring the skills I already mentioned. My heart tends more toward areas of spirituality, compassion and outreach. I enjoyed working with our partners in mission in CARE and could see myself continuing that relationship.

This time of discernment has been challenging. I am also very grateful to each sister who sent me the invitation for discernment and the messages of support and prayer. You are an example for me of strength, determination and love for the charism and the mission and that moved me a lot. I have been challenged by you to be aware that congregational leadership is for the whole congregation. For the sisters and realities of all countries. Just as I was led to reflect on whether the experiences of US domination could influence me. And what I have to say is that I have a great love for the congregation, for our charism and mission, which from an early age I learned to love as a whole, not just as a region. I don't have any regret in my heart, on the contrary, I am grateful for the leaders who allowed me to participate in international teams and experience in the USA, getting to know our history and our sisters even more, as I admire them. I dream and want to help build a united congregation, where Franciscan joy emanates from our hearts reconciled and at peace. I was also asked to take care of myself by giving myself the rest time I need. I have seriously questioned myself and God if I have the skills to contribute to the congregation at this challenging time. I don't have that much experience, I don't speak English fluently, I'm impulsive, disorganized, I don't like bureaucratic work although I can do it, and I'm honest. I am afraid of experiencing the same loneliness that I experienced when I was in the regional leadership. I am also aware that the next few years will be demanding for us and even more so for leadership. As much as we want changes, when they are about to happen, it becomes challenging, it scares us to want to go back, we are like the people in the Exodus, crying for the onions of Egypt and blaming someone. During this time I have prayed the Prayer before the crucifix and contemplated the icon of San Damiano. A few days ago, Christ spoke to me. And he asked me why I have not given myself as an instrument of Him as I have always done, since I entered the religious life. So I'm putting myself into God's hands and letting him do his work in me during this period of discernment. I am open to putting my gifts of communication, group articulation, creativity, passion, psychological knowledge, love of mission, desire to know and understand other cultures, and the energy I have, wherever the congregation needs it, whether in elected leadership or in any other instance. And I would like to know from the sisters what leadership profile we will need in the coming years. What do you believe is fundamental for the people who will be in this leadership?

Good afternoon. Like everyone who has spoken before me, I would like to thank you for allowing me to participate in this process, especially since I missed the first retreat. I do appreciate your consideration.

In the hospital, I had a lot of time to consider the call to leadership and I believe I faced the pros and cons of such a personal choice for myself. I have experienced resistance in myself and I have tried to understand why.

I recognize that I have gifts to offer the Congregation, but I do not believe they are limited to elected leadership. I see religious life today in the context of our history as women who have responded to the needs of the times by teaching, nursing, evangelizing, praying with the disillusioned, caring for the poor, daring to speak out for the immigrant, the vulnerable and the rejected. Not only Allegany, not only Franciscans, but all women religious in all countries through the centuries. In particular, I have a passion for mission and a deep belief that the Franciscan message of peace is desperately needed today, in the midst of the violence that we see in daily life. I sincerely believe we have a part to play in that call and to deny that call is to betray our vocation.

I am reluctant to give that up if elected leadership requires me to focus on our internal relationships to the neglect of the large picture of need.

What I need from you now is an understanding that I cannot commit to four years of zoom calls and meetings that will keep me from active involvement in service to the poor. These next four years of my life may well be the last four years of my life. I want the freedom to be faithful to the call I believe is from God, a call to work for justice and encounter up close and personal the suffering body of Christ.

So, I am willing to continue in the process and offer my gifts, with the understanding of what I cannot do.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that I share with you about the discernment process for congregational leadership. I would like to thank all the sisters who have made space for me by sending invitations and proposals to participate, whether they are Brazilian, Jamaican or North American. The feedback I have received on this journey is fundamental and very much appreciated by me

In these times of reflection, I feel enriched by everything I have experienced. For me, the most valuable thing is not just the possibility of joining or not joining the congregational leadership, but the understanding and joint construction that we are carrying out. I believe that we are living a true kairos as a congregation, a time of grace that invites us to be even more united and in solidarity in view of following Jesus Christ.

It's true that we face many difficulties in integrating fully because of our cultural differences. However, there is a strong commitment on the part of each of us to collaborate in building this unity that we so long for. This search for synergy between the different experiences of our sisters makes me feel expectant and hopeful.

As I reflect on the role we can play, I am convinced that this is a propitious moment for us Brazilians to participate more actively in leadership at the congregational level. Together, we are taking new steps on our journey, and this reciprocal exchange strengthens our mission. May we move forward with love and courage, always in search of unity and the strengthening of our collective journey.

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Discernment Reflection

In the invitations I received and conversations I've had with several of our sisters, it seems to me that we continue to look for leaders who work well with others and who are open to including others on the journey. REFLECTION ON DISCERNMENT

Peace and Goodness!

Initially, I am grateful to the sisters who recognized my abilities and sent me invitations to be part of the Congregational Leadership, but I confess that I was very surprised because reading the summaries that came from our assemblies, two phrases impacted me a lot: "elect new sisters to leadership who will empower the sisters and promote "New empowered leaders who can guide the sisters through transformation". transformation will be installed, putting an end to the turnover of the same leaders." I realized that I fit into these two statements: I'm not that young and I've already participated in Regional and Congregational Leadership. At first, I didn't see any point in taking part in the discernment week because God's will for me was already explicit there. At an assembly, I asked Ted if was really necessary for the sister who received the invitation to take part in the discernment and he said yes. I received the invitations, I didn't question it anymore and I went, but I only went to fulfill an obligation. When I started the process, I remained closed in on myself, but little by little, during the prayers, sharing, living with the other sisters in discernment, the priest's homilies and some letters of encouragement from sisters I received during the retreat, began to realize that something inside me was telling me: give yourself a chance to continue in the process. It's too early to give up... think of the sisters who sent you invitations, surely if they invited you it's because they trust you and your gifts. When the Discernment for Leadership Retreat took place earlier this month, I was totally unprepared for its grace-filled outcome. Although I came with a grateful heart for your letters of invitation and affirmation, I was struggling to trust the process or to admit my discomfort about making any future commitment in this time of unknowns.

As I listened to 20 sisters share reflections about their personal prayer, discernment, and their individual "leanings" about a leadership commitment, I rediscovered whole-hearted generosity, honesty and willingness to serve the Congregation in every sister's response. At the same time, our collaborative work to create mutually inclusive leadership among all sisters sparked a renewed energy within me. I value this kind of communal visioning as a profound gift of the Holy Spirit and a vital step forward in our shared journey toward transformation.

For that reason, I expressed my leaning toward continuing the discernment process to explore further how these proposed partnerships among ourselves and others will evolve. It's important for me to visualize concretely how I might contribute my gifts of listening, communicating, networking, and supporting the common good. Drawing from my current leadership experience, I'm convinced that every sister has equal voice and is welcome at the leadership table as collaborators with elected leadership, both locally and regionally. Together, and with God's guidance, it is possible to formulate and expedite the complex Congregational decision-making necessary for our future and our legacy, with assistance from professional laity, as needed.

During these days of discernment and throughout our Chapter preparations, I hope to learn from you how we may strive together as a Congregation in satisfying our hearts' desires for our Franciscan life and mission in the world today and for generations to come.

Liz Schumacher's leadership discernment response to be given Sat March 29:

Good morning/afternoon.

I wish to echo the sentiments the discerners have mentioned thanking the sisters who took the time and made the effort to write inviting us, inviting me into this discernment process. Although I did not want to be considered for leadership, I found myself accepting and even welcoming the process. The process allowed me to look at what was occurring in my world through a more considered discernment lens. I appreciate this opportunity. I appreciate too the sisters who wrote letters of support just prior to the initial retreat in early March. The support of my sisters is so affirming and humbling as well.

So, many of you know that I have a 20 year background as a civil trial attorney. Trial attorneys look at and work with facts. Every time I need to discern something, I take the time and look at facts. I look for patterns and see where the facts are leading what the facts are suggesting to me.

So, here are the facts. When I returned to Tampa late last summer following the Gathering at the Motherhouse, I began receiving more inquires from those wishing to receive spiritual direction. My spiritual direction clients began increasing. Additionally, over the fall I wound up taking 3 written exams and 1 oral exam to obtain my Florida clinical social work license enabling me to work as a therapist in Florida. Let me back up. In the fall I studied, studied, studied - - - and took 3 written and 1 oral exam to become licensed. Also, I submitted all the freakin paperwork required by the Florida Dept of Health to support of my application for my Florida counseling license.

Further, during the fall I prepared for and worked with a team of spiritual directors at the Franciscan Center to put on a silent retreat. In addition, I

worked on preparing and presenting a grief workshop during the Christmas Holidays at the Franciscan Center.

Then, in early January of this year – I received an email from the Florida Department of Health announcing that I had been granted a license in clinical social work and could begin work as a therapist. Whew! ... Yay!. Breathe.

I was then invited onto the team who conducts the retreat program at the Franciscan Center designed by Sr. Annie Dougherty called "Operation Restore". It is for first responders. This is a 4 day retreat to assist police officers, firefighters, EMTs and other first responders deal with the trauma they witness in their lives . It uses a wonderful trauma therapy called EMDR in which I am trained. I became part of the team in February of this year.

Our congregation has been blessed with congregational leaders and sisters in mission and ministry. Both are needed. Mission and ministry without leadership is chaos and congregational leadership alone without mission and ministry serves no real purpose.

Oh, and let me add 2 more facts before I conclude. When you journey with a spiritual directee you meet someone who desires a closer walk with God. How amazing is that? How wonderous is that? To witness that is . . . well so rich, so rich. You have touched the heart of our human experience.

When you meet first responders who volunteer to come to the Operation Restore retreat and allow themselves to be vulnerable, seeking help for the burdens of the traumas they've experienced . . . and you are able to assist them in lifting those traumas off their shoulders. . . well, what can I say. . . it is a direct God-experience.

Thus, I am sensing the call to withdraw from further discernment for leadership fulfilling my call to ministry. If there is a project leadership needs me to do, and I can do it, I will. What I need from you my sisters is your prayers.

If experience is the best teacher, then I should probably move to the head of the class. It was in August of 1955 ~ during a blinding rain storm, that I approached the old St. Elizabeth Motherhouse to give my life to Christ. Except, in my case, it was going to be just a temporary gift to God, so I could be free of the notion of answering a call, and get back, quickly, to my real life. Now, 70 years have passed, and I can think of no truly real life, better than the one with which I have been gifted as a member of the Franciscan Sisters of Allegany.

I never gave invitations to the discernment process a thought, but I was moved, humbled, challenged and, yes, energized, by those I received and by the notes from others which followed. Thank you, thank you.

I came to the discernment quite sure that God was not calling me to elected leadership, but filled with curiosity about what might be developing in terms of governance and leadership. And, I was not disappointed.

I think that I can speak for all our 'experienced' religious. We have lived through challenging times, but we have been enriched by our religious life, by our commitment to it and our participation in that life. And, speaking personally, even at this stage of my religious life, I am open to continue to be used by the Lord, in whatever ways might be appropriate.

The opportunities which have been afforded to me over the years are myriad, and many of the skills I developed are and were transferable. Collaboration has always been of great value and I am always anxious to take an idea and run (or perhaps now move more slowly) with it. One of my favorite sayings is 'build a better birdcage' which says let's expand on an idea and develop it even further.

I am not seeking elected leadership but I would like to use this forum as an opportunity for us, as a congregation, to take a good hard look at each other and who we are. In all stages of life, we are blessing and gift to one another and our work is not over as a congregation or as individuals. Let us all, in whatever ways we are able, continue to serve the people of God and this congregation which we love, until God issues God's final call: "Come, good and faithful servant, take possession of the kingdom I have prepared for you."

My symbol for the discernment retreat was a rock. First and foremost, rock as the foundation upon which I base my life, my relationship with Christ, my need for prayer and time for quiet.

Rock also as being "caught between a rock and a hard place", between where I experience being called and how others would like me to respond. I had shared that I was not leaning towards an elected role in leadership, however; I find myself with greater openness to the process as we discover a new paradigm.

My thanks to those who invited me to this process. Your affirmation of my love and commitment to the sisters touched me deeply. I do love you. Your reflections have given me food for thought.

I have never, neither in my religious nor professional life, sensed a call to significant roles in leadership. Forming strong relationships, supporting and caring for others in their need is where I have been drawn the most and where my gifts have been best utilized.

Some commented on my interpersonal skills, my ability to speak my truth or provide a different perspective, to listen deeply, and collaborate with others in addition to the gift of language and cultural sensitivity based upon my years in Brazil and Chile, as well as the many years in health care in the US dealing with people of many cultures. This resonates with my own experience of myself.

I find myself challenged by and yet growing in mutuality. I was asked specifically about dealing with criticism or saying my truth loud enough so it might be heard. I will speak my truth though it is difficult for me to stay in the struggle if I am dismissed, ignored or unjustly criticized. Prayer and forgiveness are what get me through though it may take time. Forgiveness is one of the greatest gifts I have experienced in my life, so I am committed to it.

I was also asked about accepting decisions that I don't really agree with. I can accept most decisions however I will question first. My experience throughout the last 30 years of translating for the many different groups in the congregation is that we as a whole often do not see the implications of some of our decisions. At times I see us as even vulnerable due to our desire to see only the good.

As for the future of the congregation, I have a deep desire for unity among us, and an even greater desire for us individually and collectively to respond to the spiritual hunger that exists in our world. I believe that vocations exist, I would want to foster vocations to any state of life. As for the US, I believe in collaboration, especially with other religious or laity who are meeting many of the spiritual needs that we are ourselves are no longer able to address. I firmly believe that as women religious, we have a unique gift to offer others with our Franciscan spirituality.
